Ones To Watch

They may not yet be on the Power 100, but here are some people to keep an eye on this year.

Joe Allen, general manager of the growing GE Global Operations Center, a focal point of development at The Banks.

Derek Bauman, former Mason police officer and an Over-the-Rhine resident who is a public transit booster as Southwest Ohio representative and vice chair of All Aboard Ohio. He's also a candidate for City Council.

Joseph W. Hagin, who grew up in Indian Hill and served as deputy chief

of staff in the George W. Bush White House. He'll have the same role in the Trump White House.

Sandra Kuehn, president and CEO of the Center for Addiction Treatment, which is in the midst of a 17,000-square-foot expansion. CAT is a focal point in the increasing battle against heroin and other addictions.

Greg Landsman, a driving force behind the successful Preschool Promise levy and unsuccessful Cincinnati City Council candidate in 2013, is again running for a council seat.

Aftab Pureval, new Hamilton Clerk of Courts, is a former Procter &

Gamble Co. attorney and is the first Democrat elected to the office in more than 100 years.

Kristen Schlotman, executive director of Film Cincinnati, the nonprofit promoting and facilitating the region's growing TV and film industry.

Don Wright, a founder and former COO of Assurex Health, the successful Mason genetics testing company, who has talked about getting involved in another start-up.

Peggy Zink, president of Cincinnati Works, the nonprofit working to eliminate barriers for those in poverty which marked its 20th anniversary last year.
